


Figure 4 The Canadian Air Gas machine. The underground vessel is labeled "Carburettor"! Note counter weight and gas lamp.

Some internet searches quickly found that the mystery item in Beaufort was built to produce gasoline vapours for gas lighting. The counter weight would activate an air pump when the lamps were lit and would automatically shut down when supply was turned off. Figure 4 is from a diagram from the "Canadian Air Gas Machine" published in 1870. The device was claimed to be very safe and efficient but it is interesting to note that the carburetor and fuel supply could be installed several





Figure 5 Diagram of Air-Gas Machine.




Figure 6 Ray Bailey's puzzle
