



CAMP OVEN MEATLOAF

Ingredients.

500g beef mince.

1 egg

1 small onion

2 tblspn bread crumbs

1 tblespn chilli sauce

10 stuffed green olives [sliced]

1/4 cup red wine

salt and pepper

Combine all ingredients in a bowl. Mix thoroughly. Spoon mixture into two greased enamel mugs. Bake in camp oven for about 25-30 minutes.

When done separate around edges with knife and remove onto a plate.

Serve with salad or veggies.

2008 DESERT WORKING PARTY



PROFILE - PETER FACY

Peter was born in 1939 in Adelaide and educated at St Andrew's School Walkerville, Pulteney Grammar and St Peters College. He left school in 1954 and joined J.W.Taylors (Later trading as Taylors of Medindie), a motor vehicle franchise selling Austin & Morris cars. After completing five years as an apprentice motor mechanic he continued his studies to complete Diesel Mechanic, Auto Electrician and Oxy Welding certificates.

Peter went to England in 1961 to complete a six-month Service Engineer's course with the British Motor Corporation sponsored by J.W.Taylors and B.M.C. Australia.

He then joined the British Merchant Navy as a 4th Engineer and completed two tours of duty, firstly on an oil tanker carrying oil to numerous Brazilian ports and secondly on a bulk ore carrier carrying iron ore from Sept-Iles in the St Lawrence River Canada and from Monrovia in Liberia to Liverpool in U.K.



Whilst coming home through South Africa he drove transports from Johanhesburg to Nairobi and back for a transport company and eventually rejoined "Taylors" in 1963. Appointed Service Manager in 1968, a position he held until 1979 when he was appointed the assistant General Manager whilst he studied Business Management majoring in Accounting at night school.

Peter was appointed General Manager (Accountant) and a Director of JWT (Sales) Pty Ltd (Taylors of Medindie) with John Taylor in 1981, a position he held until the business was sold in June 2005.

During the 50 plus years since he began at Taylors of Medindie they held many new car franchises including all the BMC range, Jaguar, Jensen, Lotus, Rover Cars, Range and Land Rovers, Citroen and finally Peugeot.

Peter lived in Medindie with his parents until he married Helen in 1969 and has subsequently lived in Tusmore for thirty-four years. They now live in Hazelwood Park in a new house they built in 2003. They have three children, Tonia and Emma who live in Melbourne and Nigel who lives in London.

During his school days Peter sang in the St Peters Cathedral choir for 5 years and was a member of the Boy Scouts before later moving to Sea Scouts. While he was a Sea Scout he was encouraged to take up ocean yacht racing and was fortunate enough to sail in five Sydney — Hobart races as well as numerous trips to Sydney from Adelaide and back from Hobart. Whilst in England in the early sixties he also sailed a number of ocean yacht races around the UK including the Fastnet race, he also holds an "Offshore Yachtmasters Certificate".

After leaving school Peter played 309 Amateur League football games for St Peters Old Collegians and retired in 1974 to the more gentile sport of golf.

He was always fascinated by the "Bush" and if it wasn't for the insistence of his Father to gain a "Trade" I imagine he would have lived all his life in the outback on sheep stations. His early school holidays were always spent with his cousin on his uncle's sheep stations, Nonning, Moonaree and Oakden Hills in the North West of SA, learning "Bush life and caring for animals and the country".

Peter's thirst for "outback travel" was fuelled by his Father who was one of the early R.A.A. mapping officers who mapped many of the outback roads in SA including driving the Nullarbor Plain to Perth in the 1920's in a RACWA vehicle to map the track.

Peter's introduction to "Four Wheel Driving" was when he purchased a left-hand drive American Willys Jeep in 1958. After major rectifications, was used for many trips to outback of SA. His first "modern" four wheel drive was a Discovery followed by two Rovers purchased in the early eightys and since then has had two more Range rovers and four Land rovers all of which have carried his family to many outback camping spots in Australia, including many Simpson Desert crossings.

Peter has been a member of the Range Rover Club of S.A. for over 20 years and holds the "Basic Recreational Four Wheel Driving Certificate" conducted by the S.A. Association of Four Wheel Drive Clubs. He has been a member of FOS for 14 years and joined FOGVD just last year.

Peter and Helen purchased a caravan two years ago and when he can persuade Helen to retire they plan to travel extensively in Australia.

MAMUNGARI DRAFT MANAGEMENT COMMENTS

As reported at the last general meeting President Marlene Friebe provided comment on the Mamungari Conservation Park Board of Management Draft Management Plan on behalf of our Friends group as follows:

- the Friends of the Great Victoria Desert Parks supporting no mining within the Park
- a glossary of terms to make the Plan more readable
- the spelling of Voakes
- preservation of both Aboriginal and European historic sites
- introduced plants and animals, in particular camel numbers should be monitored and if necessary culled
- Involving Community The Friends recognised and included within the Plan
- public access within the park
- camping a list of areas already used for camping included
- condition of tracks within the park
- provision for campfires within the park

Marlene also questioned whether Mamungari is still to be registered as a Biosphere Reserve and suggested that for the Park to retain its' recognition as both a National and International reserve of significance its' status should be included within the Plan.
